Are you ready to explore the natural beauty of the Ozarks?

Just grab a picnic lunch, jump in your car, and visit one of these beautiful areas. They are just a few minutes away.

- ***Confluence of the Roubidoux Creek and the Gasconade River.*** North of Waynesville on Hwy 17 at the first bridge.
- ***Clifty Natural Bridge***
I-44 Exit 163, north on Hwy 28 to Dixon.
Beautiful site listed as a Missouri State geologic oddity.
- ***Mill Creek and Paddy Creek in the Mark Twain National Forest.***
1 and 19 mile trails for hiking and horseback riding.
- ***Ft. Leonard Wood is a State Wildlife Management Area.***
- ***Trophy trout fishing along the Roubidoux River. Floating and Fishing*** along the ***Gasconade River***, Missouri's longest river, or the ***Big Piney River***, scenic beauty at its best.
- ***Scenic Natural Springs: Boiling, Roubidoux and Pippin.***

Interesting Story Leads

Historic Route 66

Devil's Elbow, named from the scenic bluffs such as the Sugar Bowls, view the 1940 Railroad trestle, and original motor court motels.

Agritourism

Visit a working horse farm, fish farm or tree and berry farm complete with a pumpkin patch, corn maze, and petting zoo.

Unique Experiences

The Cave Restaurant and Resort, a restaurant in a real cave. The Point Steakhouse: Beautiful scenic view from Portuguese Point overlooking the Gasconade River. Past railroad hub towns with the extinct railroad caboos located in Crocker, St. Robert, Dixon and Richland.
