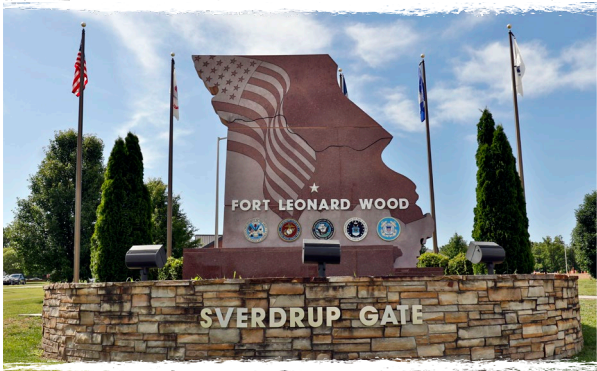


Memorial Grove

Memorial Grove includes Sapper Memorial Grove, Chemical Grove, and the Military Police Regimental Walkway and Memorial Grove. All offer a peaceful environment for Service Members — both past and present — to reflect and pay homage to fallen comrades. Wind your way through the grove to visit dedicated granite benches, bricks, and trees that display the names of Soldiers who paid the ultimate sacrifice. Visitors will marvel at the bronze sculptures onsite, such as the crossed pistol archway — dubbed the “Gateway to the Regiment” — the Marechaussee on Horseback, and the Military Working Dog statue.



WWII Company Area

This collection of restored temporary mobilization buildings is representative of the hundreds of thousands of buildings built throughout the United States from 1939-1945. During the peak of construction at Fort Leonard Wood in 1941, the rate of completion was one building every 45 minutes. During WWII, Fort Leonard Wood housed five infantry divisions, one artillery brigade, and an Engineer Replacement Training Center training more than 250,000 soldiers. Since its completion in spring 1941, more than 3 million soldiers have been trained at Fort Leonard Wood. Today, Fort Leonard Wood is considered one of the premier training installations of the Army and trains service members from all branches of the military.

Our History, Our Legacy

Named after Civilian Aide to the Secretary of the Army John Barton Mahaffey, the Mahaffey Museum Complex houses the rich history and contributions of the Military Police, Army Engineers, and Chemical Corps during conflicts dating back to the Revolutionary War. The museum complex is also adjacent to the WWII Army Complex Museum that replicates Fort Leonard Wood as it was during the 1940s. The Mahaffey Museum began as the U.S. Army Engineer Museum when it moved from Fort Belvoir, VA, in 1989. The Military Police and Chemical schools moved to Fort Leonard Wood in 1999 and brought their respective museums to the complex.

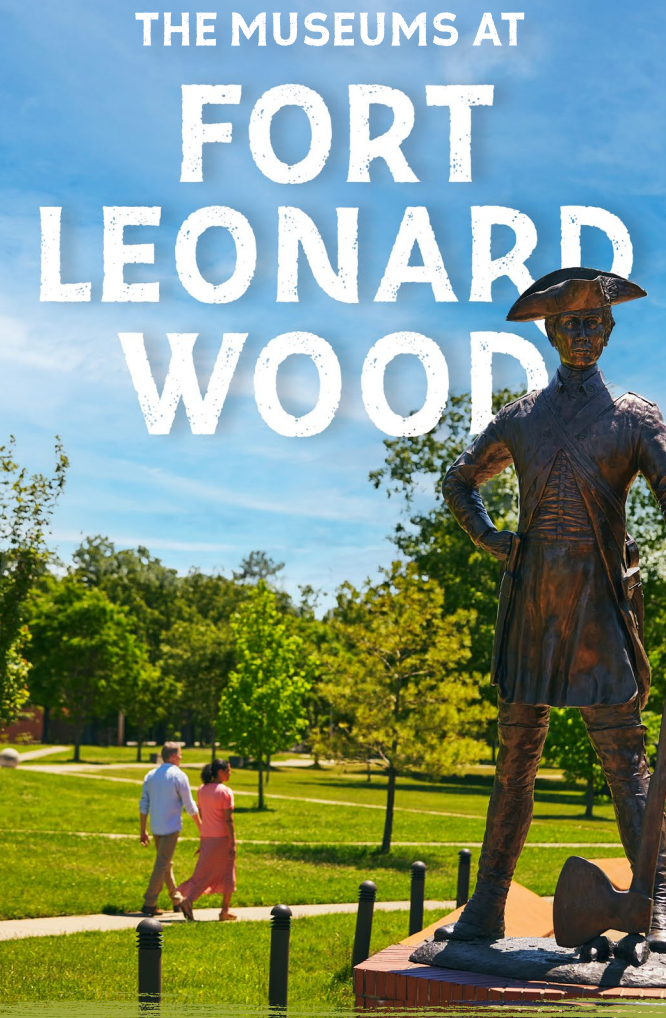

U.S. Army Chemical Corps Museum

The U.S. Army Chemical Corps Museum details the history of the Corps from 1918 to the present. Through a self-guided tour that includes a WWI trench, a WWII chemical lab, and a Gulf War bivouac, visitors can learn about how the Corps serves as the protective force against

chemical, biological, radiological, and nuclear (CBRN) threats. The displays highlight historical and modern protective gear for Soldiers, civilians, and animals. Whether you spend an hour or a day here, there is always something new to discover.

U.S. Army Military Police Corps Regimental Museum

The mission of the U.S. Army Military Police Corps Regimental Museum is to collect and preserve the material history of the Military Police from 1775 to the present. The museum also promotes the heritage and traditions of the Military Police branch

and the values of the U.S. Army to Soldiers and civilians through public exhibits, educational programs, and branch training support. The museum gallery highlights disciplines of the Military Police, including Police Operations, Detention Operations, and Security and Mobility Support.



U.S. Army Engineer Museum

The U.S. Army Engineer Museum represents the different roles engineers play in the U.S. Army. The encyclopedia gallery includes artifacts and replicas dating back to the days of paddlewheels and pontoons. The topographic area features tools and projects of surveyors and mapmakers from colonial times through the present. The land mine display features mines, detectors, and foreign armament used to develop land mine warfare technology.

All three museums are conveniently located at 495 S. Dakota Ave., Building 1607 Fort Leonard Wood, MO 65473.
